

AH, LISTENING......

A FIRST TIME CONFERENCE GOER IN BALTIMORE

s president of our MRMTA, I had the privilege of attending the joint conference in Baltimore this past March. It was quite the event with a massive trade show and a great selection of presentations. We were so proud of our 6 Canadian competitors who traveled to Maryland to compete, and I must say that sitting with eyes closed listening to their beautiful (and hard!) repertoire was indeed a highlight for me. It was amazing to sit still and just listen. I didn't have to rush home and teach; making dinner for my family was not a "Leanne problem", and when we weren't on door duty, it was our privilege to sit back and listen.

And listen we did. Check out Igudesman and Joo on youtube; we heard and watched this musical comedy duo live. We listened to Leon Fleicher lead a master class and heard him play an exquisite Claire de lune. It was all so inspiring ("oh the vast amount of gorgeous music left to learn") and motivating ("I think I could play that!"). Even just to dream of putting that many hours back into playing was a wonderful fantasy for 5 days! And who knows what I may do over the summer! 8 weeks divided by 32 sonatas..... well maybe not, but fun to entertain the idea!

One phrase I remember from the presentations was to "be straight with yourself". The presenter, Sondra Tammam was telling us about the Taubman Approach, discussing the awkward angles at which pianists can place their hands/wrists/shoulders

etc. when trying to be straight with the keys and not themselves. For example if you are playing at the extreme edges of the keyboard, your hand will not be centered at a 90 degree angle to the keys. If you do this you may just end up looking like you are flapping your wings like a chicken. Instead keep your elbows at a natural angle and perhaps your 2nd finger will be deep in the black keys with your pinky closer to the edge. Thinking through the angles of one's arms and hands was a good reminder for me that hand position is so fluid depending on what part of the keyboard we are playing on. Be straight with yourself- it makes a lot of sense, and a good way to explain it to students.

The title of Ms. Tammam's presentation was "The Choreography Of Subtle In and Out Movements At the Keyboard with the Taubman Approach". She discussed the "ins and outs" of playing, explaining how some fingers go toward the fall board as you play and others pull away. A simple pentascale can be described as a smiley face with fingers 1 and 5 being "in" notes and fingers 2,3 and 4 being "out" notes. Also, going from white to black notes can be thought of as going from "out to in", and "lower to higher" and if we watch carefully we can help our students play with more ease. "What was Chopin's favorite key?" she asked us. It's B Major, which lets us play with an easy hand. It might take some work to

convince our students that 5 sharps is easy, but you can really see the natural hand when you get a beginner to play on the black notes. Keys are not just played laterally, but vertically, and in and out as well. There are so many angles, but so many beautiful sounds possible on this great instrument, described by Kevin Olson as "the colour machine"! This well-known composer and pianist gave a talk entitled: "The Accompanist's Toolbox; Five Foundations to Artistic Accompanying".

Another highlight from Baltimore comes from my confession that I kind of got hooked on a video game at the trade show. My kids are so proud! Never mind that it's a sight reading game that assesses your right and wrong notes then scores you after playing. I must have spent an hour at this booth and am seriously considering purchasing it for my studio. The high score was out of my reach, but I did get to observe someone who did achieve the high score for the day, and he sight-read Bach fugues at an amazing pace!

What a joy to be immersed in music with other music lovers on the continent. It was wonderful to meet the other Canadian delegates, to spread the news of our upcoming 2019 conference in Winnipeg, and just sit and listen!

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



THIRD-YEAR PIANIST A FOUR-TIME NATIONAL AWARD WINNER

aul Williamson, who is in his third year studying piano at the Desautels Faculty of Music, represented Manitoba at the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Association National Competition in late March.

Not only did Paul win first prize at the Competition (\$6,000), he was also awarded three of the four special prizes:

- Dorothy Buckley Prize for the best performance of a Canadian composition (\$1,000)
- Marek Jablonski Prize for the best performance of a Chopin composition (\$1,000)
- Willard Schultz Prize for the performer whose reading of Baroque music best communicates the intentions of the composer in the opinion of the adjudicator panel (\$1,500)

"Paul's performances were outstanding," said Edmund Dawe, dean of the Desautels Faculty of Music who attended the conference/competition in Baltimore. "The demanding music he chose showcased his impressive artistry in a wide range of styles."

UM Today caught up with Paul to learn more.

You won first place at the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Association National Competition. Congratulations! How does it feel to be awarded not one, but four prizes at the competition?

Paul Williamson - I am very honoured by the results of the CFMTA piano competition! When entering the competition, I tailored my semifinal repertoire to be eligible for the additional awards in the hopes of maybe winning one of them. When I was awarded all of the semifinal prizes, I was quite surprised!

What was your journey to get to this point like?

PW - In 2013, I participated in this same competition representing B.C., the province I originally come from. It was my first time competing at the national level and unfortunately, I did not progress to finals. Since then I have gained more experience competing and when the opportunity arose to apply for the Manitoba Registered Music Teachers' Association piano competition in the hopes of representing Manitoba at the national competition, I figured why not give it another shot? Upon competing in January of this year, I was fortunate to be chosen as Manitoba's representative, and from there I flew to Baltimore and competed at the national competition in March.

My teacher was very helpful in deciding what I planned to play in the two recital rounds. He guided me in choosing repertoire that displayed as many facets of my ability as possible. Additionally, the music program at U of M is a rather tight-knit group with the atmosphere among faculty and fellow students being one of support and encouragement – this can go a long way in preparing for a competition.

CFMTA/FCAPM National Piano Competition - 2017 Baltimore, Maryland

Why did you choose the desautels faculty of music?

PW - In the summers of 2012, 2013, and 2014, I participated in the international music festival, Morningside Music Bridge, held in Calgary. The program features a distinguished faculty and while there I worked with David Moroz, my current piano teacher here at the U of M. We worked well together, so when I applied to undergraduate programs in my Grade 12 year, I decided to come to the Desautels Faculty of Music and study with him.

When did you know you wanted to be a pianist?

PW - I'm not sure I can recall a single turning point when I decided to be a pianist. I always enjoyed playing the piano even from a very young age as music was something I naturally gravitated towards. My parents have always been incredibly supportive of my endeavours; when I started to become more serious about piano in high school, they encouraged me to pursue it as a career.

What are your plans after this?

PW - This summer I will be a returning participant at the Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival in Blue Hill, Maine. I am looking forward to going back for another summer of music-making and am also excited to be part of their mentorship program for Maine students! The following academic year, I will be applying to graduate programs abroad in the hopes of furthering my musical education.

PRE-DIPLOMA GROUP

Physiotherapist and certified hand therapist from the Pan Am Clinic: Julie Scarlett

n January 15, a group of MRMTA teachers and students spent their Sunday afternoon, meeting with a very special guest-a physiotherapist and certified hand therapist from the Pan Am Clinic: Julie Scarlett. Julie was on a mission: To help us to prevent and deal with injuries that we encounter in the course of our studies or careers as teachers and performers.

First, she presented the most common problems musicians encounter in their practice, mostly with hands and back injuries. With very clear explanations, she demonstrated the effect of bad habits or postures, and how to change to a better routine of practice. Also, she discussed how to plan a progressive return to a normal practice after an injury and how to help a student who is coming back to his lessons after being in a cast or having surgery.

This presentation was followed by a period of questions, and we realized that all of us had experienced different problems at some point in our studies or teaching career.

Playing an instrument, or singing on a daily basis for hours at a time, is very demanding on our bodies. This workshop was a reminder that we must be careful, even if sometimes the passion of music or the pressure of deadlines for exams or performances take over our common sense! And definitely, reaching out for help from a physiotherapist, could save time and energy in the recovery of an injury.

In conclusion, we would like to thank Julie for her kindness and generosity as she gave us a lot more time than was planned. And we all really appreciated her enthusiasm in her presentation as well as her expertise in this matter. Maybe, we will be more careful now in our practice!

GREAT MASTERCLASSES OF OUR TIMES

nspiration. Where do we find it? You tube?
Facebook? Google? Well, you can turn to your electronic devices if you'd really like, but a live Masterclass beats them all in my opinion. It's always full of the unknown. What will the master say? How does he/ she teach? Is this going to be worth my time? It never disappoints! And they always leave me wanting more.

Since my return from Europe and rejoining the MRMTA as a member and serving on the executive, the biggest and most wonderful opportunities have afforded themselves to me. That is: Masterclasses! I've heard the likes of Janer Scott Hoyt, Jamie Parker, Andre' Laplante, Mary Lou Fallis, Richard Margison, Isabel Bayrakdarian, Janina Fialkowska and now....in Baltimore at the MTNA- CFMTA/FCAPM Commemorative Conference, Leon Fleisher. Wow! Reading back on that list of names shows that the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' really does provide quality to its members! I met and heard all of these artists at our conferences across Canada.

Now, some of those masters were sweet, some.... well, not-so-nice, but whatever their ways, it sure has been interesting to witness their methods as a fellow teacher. Whatever these great musicians have had to say....is always a lesson! There is always the "take it or leave it" philosophy behind witnessing the classes. It's good to take the occasional not-so-nice comments and learn from them, but best to hear underneath all those words exactly what is being said.

In March, I was privy to Canadian pianist, Janina Fialkowska's Masterclass in Winnipeg and American pianist, Leon Fleisher's Masterclass in Baltimore. I thought I'd share a few memorable quotes and antics from my memories of these two recent events. Since this is the day and age of finding those quotable quotes, I managed to write down a lot of them. I've chosen a few favorites to share with you.

The wonderful Janina Fialkowska said about Chopin: "Even in the runs, if you slow down it's a melody!" and "Sometimes simple is more important, Chopin wasn't self indulgent". The best quote I take away from Janina is "If you start with enough volume and weight you have somewhere to go in the phrase". What a great way to put it. This works with my voice and piano teaching!

She mentioned a particular quote from Rubenstein, who said to Janina 50 years ago at her first Masterclass with a master, (which went something like this): "The difference between a really good pianist and a real musician is that every note has a meaning. It gives you complete control."

Moving on to Leon Fleisher, what can one say? The privilege of seeing him perform and speak to roughly 2,000 music teachers was awesome (this overused word seems trite, but it is exactly correct). He wasn't even fazed. I should mention that in his concert, he refused all cameras to televise him playing and would not have any amplification. The room was so silent you could hear a pin drop for an hour and a half. His Clair de lune – Debussy, brought me and my fellow Canadians to tears. But I digress.

GREAT MASTERCLASSES OF OUR TIMES - CONT.

In the Masterclass the biggest point that he kept making was about playing piano and how to really learn to master pianissimo. He said to start by literally playing on top of the notes; ghosting is the term we use. While doing so, you should allow the occasional note to play, until they all sound; softly. Continue doing this while you are actually touching the notes as lightly as you can. Voila', THAT is your pianissimo. When I got home, my first student of the day got the "piano" lesson! And it worked!! I was so inspired. This was how he played the Debussy, without seemingly even touching the notes.

But the biggest lesson I learned from both Janina and Leon...

I know it sounds silly, but this is it....use the soft pedal! Yes, we take so much time teaching our students how to play into the keys and to control the notes and to find the right touch, but a ppp, is a pianissimissimo and needs the soft pedal. Says Janina about the soft pedal, "that's what it's there for" (to play softer), and Leon finished it by saying "USE IT!" over and over again. Darn it all, I guess you'll be seeing my students playing their ppp with the soft pedal from now on.
