



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READY-CONNECT!

In their bios you'll discover numerous Manitoba connections among these 6 talented, world-class musicians. Each has agreed to perform at the opening night Gala Concert, July 3, which will focus on the 100th Anniversary of the MRMTA and showcase all kinds of Manitoba talent. To add to the excitement, the book by Dr. Muriel Smith "Manitoba Registered Music Teachers' Association: A Century of Sound Connections" will be launched. What an inspiring way to begin the conference!

Poster Sessions have recently been added to the conference schedule on the suggestion of Patricia Frehlich, CFMTA/FCAPM Professional Development and Research Chair. Poster Sessions are a time for sharing ideas and research in an informal setting. Posters will be displayed and presenters available to discuss their findings. But wait – there's more! Two of our piano jurors will be giving **workshops** during the conference. Christine Vanderkooy will address the topic of performance anxiety and present some coping strategies. Douglas Finch will introduce the art of classical improvisation through games and exercises. A piano master class will be open to conference attendees and the public to attend. A recent *addition* to the schedule is that our wonderful panel of vocal jurors has agreed to facilitate a **master class** for those semi-finalists not advancing to the final round of competition. The vocal master class will be open to conference attendees and the public to attend as well.

Besides the three main prizes for the vocal competition, the following additional awards will be presented to competitors from the semi-final round:

Orville J. Derraugh Prize: \$1,500.00

- for the best performance of a Canadian composition

Tiffany A. Wilson Prize: \$750.00

- for the best performance sung in Italian

Call for Poster Session

The CFMTA/FCAPM conferences gather teachers and researchers to share and discuss various aspects of teaching and learning in music such as: musical development, curriculum design, music for special needs, and for lifelong learning. For 2019, we are especially interested in posters along the theme of "Sound Connections".

We will be accepting posters for display in two categories as follows:

Pedagogical

Submissions in this category will be evaluated and selected by the conference committee based on how the teaching activities or pedagogical content relates to our theme "Sound Connections" and whether we think it will be of interest to the conference attendees.

Research

Submissions in this category will be peer-reviewed and acceptance will be based on the quality of the research and the topic covered.

Required Submission Materials:

- For pedagogical presentation: 1-2 page proposal indicating topic and summary of the content
- For research presentation: 1-2 page proposal indicating topic, research problem, methodology and a summary of results

PLUS

- On a <u>separate</u> page indicate each author's name, institutional affiliation (if appropriate), contact information including e-mail address for one person.
- Clearly indicate if you want your application to be evaluated by the pedagogy committee or the research committee (blind-review).

Please note the following:

- Maximum allotted poster space is 36 x 48 inches.
- Only one submission per person will be accepted.
- When submitting put "Poster Session Proposal" in the subject line.
- Only Word or PDF submissions will be accepted.

Introducing Our Jurors . . . Piano





DOUGLAS FINCH, Canadian pianist and

composer, is known for his innovative and imaginative approach to performance, and for helping to revive the lost art of classical improvisation in concert.

Finch was born in Winnipeg, and had his initial musical

training with his mother and later Winnifred Sim and Jean Broadfoot. He continued at the University of Western Ontario with William Aide and then at Juilliard with Beveridge Webster. After winning a Silver Medal at the Queen Elisabeth International Competition in Brussels in 1978, he began to perform extensively throughout Canada, and devoted much of his time to composition, with a number of his works being broadcast on CBC Radio.

In 1993 he settled in London, UK, and soon afterwards cofounded The Continuum Ensemble with conductor Philip Headlam, premiering over 40 new works and recording for Avie and NMC (music by Errollyn Wallen and Roger Smalley). He has been artistic director of several acclaimed events in London, including 'In the MOMENT', a 2009 festival of dance and music at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance, Greenwich that featured over 350 performers.

Finch has written works for piano, chamber ensemble, orchestra and theatre, as well as soundtracks for four feature-length films by British director Jon Sanders; Late September (2009) - features Douglas as a pianist/character in the film. His 'Night Love Song - Concerto for Viola and Chamber Orchestra' was premièred by Rivka Golani and the Canadian Sinfonietta at the Glenn Gould Concert Hall, Toronto, November 24, 2012.

Douglas Finch is Professor of Piano and Composition at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance, and a regular guest teacher at Chetham's School of Music, Chetham's International Piano Summer School, and the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama.



SCOTT MEEK, top prizewinner of several national and international competitions, has performed as soloist with the Toronto, Edmonton, and Winnipeg Symphony Orchestras, and has performed solo recitals for the University of British Columbia's

Noon Hour Recital Series and the Women's Musical Club of Winnipeg. Additionally, he has performed in many series in western Canada, including Capilano University Cap Classics, Qualicum Beach Music on Sunday, West Vancouver Community Arts Council, and Valley CrossWay. In Winnipeg, he performs regularly with violinist Oleg Pokhanovski in his series Oleg and Friends. Internationally, he has performed with the Oberlin Orchestra and the Indiana University ad hoc Orchestra, and has won bronze medals at the Corpus Christi International Competition and at the World Piano Competition in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Scott began piano studies at the age of six, taking lessons with Carole Pollard in Winnipeg, Manitoba, before enrolling at Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio, to earn his Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Arts (East Asian Studies) degrees, studying piano under Alvin Chow. At the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, Scott received his Master of Music and Doctor of Music degrees, studying under world-renowned pianist and Distinguished Professor, Menahem Pressler.

Currently, Scott is a sought-after collaborative pianist and teacher in Vancouver, teaching at various schools around Greater Vancouver, and accompanying the studio of violin professor emeritus Taras Gabora. He also regularly performs piano four-hands recitals as the Meeks Duo with his wife, pianist Clare Yuan.

CHRISTINE VANDERKOOY

has performed as a soloist across Canada, and in the United States and Europe, including a European recital tour funded by the SSHRC General Research Fund/President's Fund. Her CD release, Schubert and Schumann, recorded at the Banff Centre for the Arts, was funded by a University of Regina grant,

and promoted by Toronto publicist, Jane Harbury, with grant funding from Creative Saskatchewan. This recording features two important solo piano works from the romantic piano literature and has enjoyed critical acclaim including a cover story for Tempo magazine, and radio play on CBC and stations across Canada and the U.S.

Dr. Vanderkooy's research contributions as a writer and presenter include a conference presentation in Florence, Italy, an invited presentation at the University of Arizona on the psychological and physiological aspects of Music Performance Anxiety, a CFMTA national convention presentation on Beethoven's pedaling in piano works, and a presentation at Bishop's University on Russian piano music. By invitation, she has contributed an article for the Royal Conservatory of Music blog, designed a course for RCM's use entitled "Piano Pedagogy: Gesture and Sound", and travelled with the senior pedagogy team across Alberta as a presenter for the RCM Teacher Professional Development Seminars. A senior examiner for the Royal Conservatory of Music, Dr. Vanderkooy also travels regularly to adjudicate music festivals and present masterclasses across Canada, and has served on juries for music competitions including the JUNO Awards.

Dr. Vanderkooy has taught at McGill University, University of Prince Edward Island, Lakehead University, and University of Regina. She joined the University of Windsor's Faculty of Education in 2017 as Associate Professor of Instrumental Music Pedagogy.

PHILLIP ENS, bass, is a Manitoban who made his debut with the Manitoba Opera in 1985, and has since developed an international career performing with major orchestras and opera companies throughout Europe and North America.

From 1993-1997, Mr. Ens was principal bass

with the Staatsoper Stuttgart, performing numerous roles including Sarastro, Banquo (Macbeth), Pimen (Boris Godunov), and Fafner and Hunding in their new production of the Ring Cycle. Other European credits during this period include the role of Ramfis in Robert Wilson's new production of Aida with La Monnaie in Brussels,), Sarastro with Staatsoper Hamburg and Staatsoper Berlin, Colline, Commendatore and Fafner at the Bayerische Staatsoper, Padre Guardiano (La Forza del Destino) for the Deutsche Oper Berlin, Claggart (Billy Budd) for the Welsh National Opera, and Hunding with Teatro Real de Madrid. Numerous orchestral credits include appearances with the BBC prom series and the Festivals of Salzburg and Edinburgh.

Important debuts in the past decade include his Metropolitan Opera debut as Hunding under the baton of James Levine, under whose direction he returned for two new productions as Commendatore and Wurm (Luisa Miller), as well as Tiresias (Oedipus Rex) with Gergiev. Other credits include the Paris Bastille, the Royal Opera House-Covent Garden, Chicago Lyric Opera, and the San Francisco Opera as Claggart, a role he also performed at the Houston Grand Opera, and in Glyndebourne's first ever production of Billy Budd, the DVD production of which received a Grammy nomination as best opera recording of 2012.

Recent role debuts include Arkel (Pelleas et Melisande), Claudius (Hamlet) with Theater an der Wien and Fiesco (Simone Boccanegra) with the Canadian Opera Company.



JOHN GREER is an active accompanist, vocal coach, arranger, composer and conductor who has been heard in these capacities throughout Canada and abroad in recital and various CBC broadcasts. He is an honoured music graduate of the University of Manitoba where he studied

piano and composition with Boyd McDonald, and of the University of Southern California where he was a student of pianists Gwendolyn Koldofsky and Brooks Smith, and harpsichordist Malcolm Hamilton.

As a faculty member of the University of Toronto opera division, Mr. Greer made his conducting debut in 1983. He has conducted numerous operas there and also for Victoria's Opera Piccola, Ottawa's Opera Lyra, The Banff School of Fine Arts, Toronto Gilbert & Sullivan Society, and Mirvish Productions. He has worked on productions with Opera (Hamilton) Ontario and the Canadian Opera Company where duties included chorus master and assistant conductor. Mr. Greer worked as Music Director of the Eastman Opera Theatre in Rochester, NY, and the Opera Studio (University of Maryland). From 2003-10 he was Director and Chair of Opera Studies at the New England Conservatory in Boston and he worked as Head Vocal Coach for the University of Kentucky voice and opera in Lexington for three years. For ten seasons his summers were occupied with his duties as General Manager and Head of Music Staff for the Janiec Opera Workshop at the Brevard Music Center in North Carolina. Mr. Greer has also been on the music staff of Glimmerglass and Chautauqua Opera Companies.

Mr. Greer's compositions include ten song cycles and numerous works based on Canadian folk song. He has written two operas for the Canadian Children's Opera Chorus and a revision and orchestration of the 1889 Canadian operetta Leo the Royal Cadet by O.F. Telgmann, commissioned by Toronto Operetta Theatre.

ADRIANNE PIECZONKA, soprano, grew up in Burlington, Ontario and made her professional debut in 1988 with the Canadian Opera Company. She studied voice at the University of Western Ontario and University of Toronto.

In 1989 she became a member of the Vienna Volksoper and in 1991

she joined the Vienna State Opera. She has sung at every major opera house including La Scala, Metropolitan Opera New York, Royal Opera House in London, Teatro Colon Buenos Aires, Opera de la Bastille Paris, Toronto and many more. She has appeared at the summer festivals in Bayreuth, Salzburg, Edinburgh and Glyndebourne.

Adrianne has sung with many of the world's finest conductors including Sir Georg Solti, Riccardo Muti, Claudio Abbado, James Levine, Zubin Mehta, Christian Thielemann and Kirill Petrenko.

Recent highlights include singing The Marschallin (Der Rosenkavalier) in Munich with the Bavarian State Opera and on tour at Carnegie Hall. She also performed the title role of Tosca at the Canadian Opera Company, the Royal Opera House in London and at Dresden's Semperoper. She specializes in the roles of Richard Strauss, most notably Ariadne (Ariadne auf Naxos), Arabella, The Empress (Frau ohne Schatten) and The Marschallin (Der Rosenkavalier).

Adrianne enjoys singing concerts and recitals and recently performed Schubert's Song Cycle "Die Winterreise" in Madrid, Montreal and Toronto.

In 2007 the Austrian Government awarded her the title "Kammersängerin" which recognizes her outstanding achievement on the operatic stage. She was made an Officer of the Order of Canada in 2008 and named a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada in 2009. Adrianne is a Dora and Juno award winner and has recorded several CDs and DVDs. She lives with her family in Toronto.

MICHELLE grew up in Steinbach, Manitoba where she attended the Steinbach Regional Secondary School and graduated in 1988. She led her volleyball team to the 1987 "AA" Provincial Championship. Michelle was recruited to play with the University of Manitoba Lady Bisons in 1988 and was the starting setter as they won the National

Championship in 1990, '91 and '92. Throughout her University career she garnered many personal awards including being named the University of Manitoba Female Athlete of the year in 1993.

Also during Michelle's university years she was the starting setter on the 1989 Canada Summer Games Bronze Medal team, a member of the Junior National team (1990) and two World Student Games teams (1991 and '92). May of

1993 marked the start of Michelle's career as a member of the Senior National Team. In 1995, she was part of the bronze medal finish at the Pan Am Games in Argentina. The team qualified for the Olympic Games in March, 1996 and in July of that same year, the team finished 9th at the Summer Olympics in Atlanta.

While volleyball is important, it is not the only facet of Michelle's life. Music is certainly the other side of things. She began to study music at the age of 4 and studied piano and voice for many years. Michelle graduated from the University of Manitoba School of Music in 1993 with a Bachelor of Music, Piano Performance. In both 1992 and '93, she participated in the National Music Competition and also in 1993, completed a 12-concert solo piano tour of Western Canada through CFMTA's Young Artist Competition. As a member of the National Youth Choir in 1992 and 1993, she performed throughout Canada and at the World Symposium of Choirs.

Michelle's story of overcoming obstacles and persevering "no matter what" is inspiring. Her life of sports and music will be a great conclusion to our conference and fits well with our theme of 'sound connections'.






A Wine-Up Afternoon in June


Sheen's taste in music varies greatly, from pop to classical and jazz to ethnic. Sheen's musical interest is part of a







Albert Chen Biography

ince the age of seven, pianist Albert Chen has achieved numerous successes in regional, provincial, national, and international competitions. Albert has been a national finalist at the Canadian Music Competition from 2012 to 2014. In 2013, he represented Manitoba at the FCMF National Music Festival in Waterloo while being the youngest pianist in the competition. He was awarded 1st prize in the 2013 University of Manitoba Preparatory Studies Piano Concerto Competition in the same year. In 2014, Albert won the MRMTA Scholarship Competition and was recommended to nationals for the CFMTA National Piano Competition in Halifax where he was awarded the Willard Schultz prize for being the "most promising artist". In the Winnipeg Music Festival, he has won the John Melnyk Trophy for the best concerto performance, Jean Broadfoot Trophy for the best sonata performance, RCM of Music Alumni Chapter Trophy for the best piano performance, and the Lieutenant Governor's Trophy for being the best performer in the entire festival. He was awarded 1st place at AMAF provincials and represented Manitoba at the FCMF National Finals for three consecutive years from 2013 to 2015. In addition, he was runner up to the top instrumental trophy, the Aikins Trophy. From 2012 to 2016, Albert was selected as one of six pianists across Canada to participate in the prestigious Morningside Music Bridge program, where he studied and played in masterclasses conducted by many professors from the top music schools around the world, including Andre Laplante, Kum Sing Lee,

John Perry, Krzysztof Jablonsky, and Meng-Chieh Liu. His recordings have been included in two of the Morningside Music Bridge Highlight Collection CD's, showcasing the top performances in the program each year. Albert was a 1st place winner in the 2015 American Protégé International Piano and Strings Competition, in which he performed at Weill Recital Hall of Carnegie Hall in New York City. In the summer of 2016, Albert's chamber group was selected to perform in the Forbidden City Concert Hall in Beijing China as part of the Highlights Concert of the 20th anniversary of Morningside Music Bridge. Furthermore, Albert was among the winners of the 2017 U of M Concerto Competition and will be performing Beethoven's Piano Concerto no. 5 "Emperor" with the University of Manitoba Symphony Orchestra in the 2018-2019 season as a featured soloist. He also won the biannual 2018 Western Young Artist Series Competition and will be going on tour across Manitoba and Saskatchewan in September/October of 2018. Most recently, Albert was awarded 1st prize at the 2018 Lawrence Genser Scholarship Competition for the highest level of solo performance at the University of Manitoba. Albert is currently in his 2nd year at the Desautels Faculty of Music under the tutelage of Dr. David Moroz and is the recipient of the prestigious Katherine May Quilliam Scholarship, which is awarded once every four years for the top undergraduate pianist. He is recognized as a President's Scholar at the U of M and has been placed on the Dean's Honour List for outstanding academic and musical achievements.


Did you know??


