

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A Century of Sound Connections: The Manitoba Registered Music Teachers'Association 1919 – 2019

In the book, A Century of Sound Connections: The Manitoba Registered Music Teachers' Association 1919–2019, musicologist Muriel Smith traces the one hundred year history of the MRMTA, investigating the impact of the activities of its members and their pupils on Manitoban and Canadian culture. Chapters can be read either in or out of sequence as each tells a distinct story such as "The Music Option Program" of the 1920s, "Melody Way Scandal" of the 1930s and "Musiktanz and Pianothon" in the latter part of the twentieth century. The final chapter addresses some current challenges faced by the organization. Smith seeks to encourage dialogue around questions of inclusivity, not only in its membership but also in is role as music educators. While this may be daunting and potentially controversial territory, it offers food for thought and marks the beginning of the second century of the MRMTA. A Century of Sound Connections: The Manitoba Registered Music Teachers' Association 1919–2019 will be available for purchase at the 2019 CFMTA/FCAPM conference in Winnipeg at the low price of twentyfive dollars.





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Canada Music Week®

Manitoba's Canada Music Week® (CMW) recital was made special this year by a focus on Manitoba composers. Of 25 performances, 12 were of music by Manitoba composers. An extra layer of interest was added by having 6 Manitoba composers in attendance, 5 of whom spoke about their piece that was to be performed. One performer, Sheen, spoke about and sang a piece she had composed herself. Her piece, Stronger, was a winner in the CFMTA/FCAPM Student Composer Competition.

Many students introduced their own pieces, making interesting and insightful comments about the music and the composers. Kevin, who performed *V:Valse Chromatique* by S.C.Eckhardt-Gramatté, said that he pictured a ballet dancer, dancing in the mountains. Anna, who performed *Butterfly-fly* by Rémi Bouchard, said, "A butterfly is a symbol of happiness, so this piece is light and happy." Martina played *Dance* (Juba) by R. Nathaniel Dett. She said she loves to perform this piece to inspire others to learn it, too, since it is such a fun piece to play. Isabella, who performed *Arctic Voices* by Susan Griesdale, had emailed her composer and asked what it is like to be a composer. Isabella told us that Ms Griesdale had answered that she liked a blank piece of paper, full of possibilities, and that she liked hearing how different people interpret her compositions.

Other students were asked about their pieces at the intermission. Anna-Lucia said of Teresa Richert's composition, *Soaring Seagulls*, that she likes imagining the seagulls, and that she had watched some videos of gulls and water, as part of her preparation of this piece. Candace played *Glowing Goldfish* by Julianne Warkentin. Candace said, "The piece starts peacefully. It has an exciting part near the end. At the end it sounds completed."

The student performers all received a pencil and a coupon that they could redeem at our used music book sale sponsored by our Pre-Diploma program. Students had prepared an information page about the composer of their piece. These were posted near the refreshments table, where juice and beautiful Canada cakes were served by MRMTA member Vivian Klosse.

A wonderfully interesting variety of music was performed throughout the recital. It was delightful to hear polished, musical performances by beginners right up to university professors. Congratulations on a job well done, to all of the performers and their families, and to the 13 MRMTA members who helped the students prepare. Thank-you to all the volunteers of this event, particularly the organizer and emcee, MRMTA member Lee Houghton Stewart.

We Say Farewell to Dmitri Hvorostovsky (1962 - 2017)

n November 22, 2017, Dmitri Hvorostovsky, the legendary operatic baritone passed away, at the age of 55. Hvorostovsky's passing was one of the unfortunate events of the modern opera world, that led hundreds of thousands of his fans worldwide to grieve. He will be remembered for his roles as Eugene Onegin in the homonymous opera by Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-1893), Valentin in *Faust* by Charles Gounod (1818-1893), Belcore in *L' Elisir d' Amore* by Domenico Donizetti (1797-1848), Rodrigo in *Don Carlo* by Giuseppe Verdi (1813-1891), and many more.

In November 22, 2017, I was in my office at Providence University College, preparing for my classes, when I received an e-mail with the sad news. While reading one of Hvorostovsky's obituaries, I heard baritone David Klassen, instructor of voice at Providence talking to one of his students outside my office. This was a providential and revealing moment, as I felt that I should write a piece about Hvorostovsky. I ran outside of my office and asked David if he would be interested in singing something for Hvorostovsky and he spontaneously agreed, although the piece did not even exist yet. The following day I asked poet Luann Hiebert, who teaches Literature at Providence, if she would write a "farewell" for the great baritone and the rest is history!

The piece was premiered by baritone David Klassen and pianist Tracey Regier Sawatzky at the Spring Recital of Providence University College, on March 31, 2018, and was recorded a few weeks later with the same performers. The video of the performance was uploaded on various social media platforms¹, and received positive comments from around the world.

The score was submitted for publication to the Italian Da Vinci Publishing² and was published in June 2018, to complete a successful journey of a collective work by faculty of Providence University College. However, this was not the end of the cycle. A number of opera singers from all over the world who heard the piece, expressed the interest to record it, radio producers and journalists asked for interviews, fan groups of Hvorostovsky shared

the piece on their websites, the Russian ambassador of Cyprus forwarded the video to Russian cultural institutions and organizations, prestigious music schools e.g. the Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky Conservatory, and they shared it with their friends as well.

What is the meaning and the message of this piece, and why does it appeal to so many people from different countries and various cultural backgrounds? The question is not an easy one to answer. One has to bear in mind that Dmitri Hvorostovsky was one of the best opera singers of his generation, and -at the same time- a symbol of the opera per se. In many ways Hvorostovsky became the roles that he performed to such an extent, that he carried them with him in his journey and his personal life. He was seen as a hero, a living legend and a symbol of the opera. For many, he was a living hope that beauty, kindness, and emotion will prevail. He was also a powerful figure in the industry of opera, who had a broad range of repertoire ranging from the classical opera roles to Russian folk songs and crossover repertoire in collaboration with pop artists. Hvorostovsky showed, in his own unique way, that there is only good and bad music and genres do not matter.


With this project we honour a great artist, and send a positive message that reflects a vibrant, creative, and collegial environment of education at Providence. This is a work that connects the emotion with the intellect and the knowledge within a kind gesture of appreciation to a great artist. This was also an important moment for everyone involved in this project to remember the power of our art and the responsibility that goes along with it. In a sense, "We Say Farewell" means we care. We express our feelings and ideas in a clear and transparent way, using our creativity to inspire as we were inspired. Hopefully, this work will reach the right ears and the right hearts.

The music material is shaped around a "signal motive" that is heard at the very beginning of the piece and returns before the refrain (ex.1). The "signal motive" consists of a harmonious and consonant beginning (an arpeggio of a minor seventh chord) that gradually becomes more dissonant to give a characteristic dissonant ending of denial.





The harmony of the piece introduces an inner "sighing theme" that follows and accompanies the main melody of the piece from the beginning to the end. The middle note (ex.2) or the higher voice of the harmony (ex.3) move stepwise up and then down or just down, to give this mourning effect to the piece.

Although the tonal centre of the introduction is C (and one would argue that the piece is in C minor) there is a quick and abrupt modulation in A minor on bar 7. This abrupt and distant modulation is not the only one in the piece; there is one from A minor to C minor on bar 19, one from C minor to E minor on bar 49, and one from E minor to C minor on bar 62. These abrupt modulations based on a relation of a third, symbolize the dramatic and unexpected ending of Hvorostovsky's career and life.

The form of the piece is cyclic as the "signal motive" will reluctantly return to the idea of the farewell as presented in the refrain. The rhythm of the piece is very static and dramatic with rare changes, just to emphasize the mournful and heavy atmosphere of the lament-like piece. This allows the melody to underline the words of the poem, allowing the performer to express its dramatic nature. 

April Gibson

It is a special honour to be recognised as a "Teacher of Distinction" today. I am grateful to the Royal Conservatory of Music for providing Canada with an exam curriculum and academic programs for over one hundred years.

My students have been inspired by the high calibre of music and mixture of styles in the RCM Repertoire Series. As a teacher of many students, these books provide a core resource in my studio.

For over 35 years, I have registered countless students for RCM exams in Alberta, British Columbia and now Manitoba. Preparing for an exam is a challenging goal that gives a tremendous sense of accomplishment when completed. It is a marvellous opportunity for team effort between the teacher and the student. There is purpose and momentum to the lessons, as development of all musical skills are achieved.

In my experience, the most rewarding lessons are carefully planned and always looking forward to the next challenge and goal. Teachers should provide many creative illustrations and exercises to demonstrate a point. Students should be encouraged to be think critically as well as to play from the heart. Humour and kindness should be always present. Time should be spent with the teacher simply to make music; to play a duet, improvise and to possibly inspire a new composition. After all, our students will be the Canadian Composers in the future.

Our collective goal as examiners, teachers, students and parents is to foster life- long learning and enjoyment of music. We work together to inspire students to expand their music making experiences from year to year. How wonderful it is to be teaching adult students who are in their 60's and beyond and many of them are taking exams!

Unlike many other professions, a music teacher doesn't necessarily have retirement on their radar. My mother in law is 86 and still busy teaching and playing as an organist in BC. My grandmother was in a jazz band in her 90's and played piano for devotions the day she passed away at the age of 101!

Congratulations to all students receiving medals today and a special thankyou to Dad's and Mom's for investing in an instrument and lessons for your children.

Loren Hiebert

We just might have one of the coolest jobs in the world. People actually pay us to be in a room and push black and white buttons. Oh, AND they pay us to show their kids how to push black and white buttons. Well okay, there's a bit more to it than that.

So here's what we do - we play. Yes, we work sometimes too, but the ultimate goal is to PLAY. What do we play? Well, of course we learn to play music, but what does that mean? Why do we call it playing an instrument? Why don't we "work" the piano?

Because music is intended to bring play into our lives. We learn some music, and then we play it. But also, we play WITH it. We play with time – learning about spacing, cadencing, breathing, rubato. We play with interpretation: mood, tempo, colour. We improvise – playing around with inventing new tunes, playing with re-harmonization and new beats when playing familiar tunes. Sometimes we play with language and concepts as we learn to connect to music more deeply.

Yes, we play - AND we connect. We connect with composers and their context in place and time. We connect with the piece of music as we prepare

it, and with the audience as we perform it. As teachers we connect with students as we work together to form partnerships of mutual trust and respect.

So, getting paid to play and make fun connections. It's musical Lego!

I'm so grateful to the Royal Conservatory of Music for creating this award. It acknowledges the work of so many music teachers across the country. Grateful also for the conservatories in this country that provide guidance and structure in the work we do as private teachers. What a valuable resource! We feel the support of our home communities, province and country in valuing the arts. I can't imagine a better environment to nurture my efforts as a young, inexperienced teacher about forty years ago.

First in Altona/Gretna, then later in Winkler and Morden and beyond, the southern Manitoba region has been a wonderful place to develop as a teacher.

I'm so thankful for the wonderful teachers I had: Glenn Loewen, Don Henry, Jenny Regehr and Joan Passey for all their patient encouragement.

I've had the privilege of teaching around 800 students these past forty years or so. I'm thankful for each one. Some have been STRONG learning experiences, but every single one welcome. Two of those students are here today, and I'd like to thank Clarissa Unger and Anna Schwartz for nominating me for this award, AND for being here today!

Thanks to my wife, Lori, and my kids for being here, and always supporting me in this career. And finally, thanks to all of you for being here, and supporting musical education in your home and in the community.

CFMTA Western Area Young Artist Tour 2018

Muriel Smith - Western Area Young Artist Tour Convenor

Pianist Albert Chen won the Western Area Young Artist Competition in the spring of 2018. A six-concert tour was organized with Chen performing three concerts in Manitoba—Gimli (September 15th), Winnipeg (September 23rd) and Killarney (September 26th)—followed by three in Saskatchewan—Regina (September 28th), Swift Current (September 29th) and Saskatoon (September 30th). A seventh concert had been planned for Rosetown, Saskatchewan. Unfortunately, the logistics of a concert tour in two provinces and lasting for few weeks became too difficult. This is an area of concern that should be addressed by CFMTA/FCAPM prior to the 2020 tour.

As an excellent ambassador for the CFMTA/FCAPM Young Artist program, pianist Albert Chen is first-rate young pianist, who is also personable and well spoken. He took time to speak to young audience members at the concerts, answering their questions and encouraging them to continue to study music. His concert program was as follows:

Young Artist Tour 2018 - Albert Chen

As an emerging pianist growing up in today's system of classical music, competitions for me are the norm while concerts are rare and few in between. I often look back on my year realizing that every single performance I have done were for competitions. Therefore, there has always been a certain sense of restriction when I perform. The Western Young Artist Concert Tour has been an eye-opening experience for me and has changed the way I view music. It made me realize that the ultimate reward to performing is the act of sharing your music with other people along with the freedom to express whatever you wish. I experienced this as I made my way across Manitoba and Saskatchewan with my parents, performing and meeting many wonderful people while sharing the simple gift of music along the way.

The tour began in Gimli at the beautiful home of Muriel Smith. I would like to thank her for all the work she has done organizing the entire tour. She gave my parents and I a warm welcome to her home with a very nice "performance venue", equipped with great acoustics and

It is highly probable that in these communities, an artist of this caliber is not often heard, however, it is an indication that more rural communities should be supporting the Young Artist tour. With encouragement from the MRMTA and the SRMTA, it may be possible to convince one or more smaller communities to engage with the 2020 CFMTA/FCAPM Young Artist Tour.

a stunning view of the river on one side and the golden sunset with the silhouette of birds flying overtop on the other. The first performance of my tour went really well, the piano had a great action and a really powerful resonance that seemed to amplify the 8th Prokofiev Sonata to a whole new level.



I was really thankful for all the wonderful teachers and students who came to the concert. Everyone I met were very enthusiastic about music and it is nice to know that communities like this exist within Manitoba, where a small group of people have so much passion and dedication for music.

Next up was Winnipeg. I performed for the MRMTA's annual AGM meeting with a nice piano that seemed to produce the perfect soft tone quality, most suitable for

Scarlatti. Since the church was in close proximity to the university, I was glad to see a few friends who came to the concert. I would like to thank Annette Hay for organizing this concert and all the piano teachers in Winnipeg who contribute so much to the vibrant classical music community that we have in this city.

The main length of the tour came the following week with the first concert being in Killarney Manitoba, a little less than two hours away southwest from Winnipeg. It was my first time visiting Killarney and I did not know what to expect. Little did I know that I would meet some of the kindest and most generous people I have ever met. My parents and I were first greeted by Marla Winters and her mother, who generously took us to the local diner for a "pre-concert" meal. Afterwards, we went over to the church and I had some time to acquaint myself with the piano. It was a very spacious and beautiful church, with wonderful acoustics and atmosphere. As the concert time approached, I went backstage as they started to let the audience in. At first, I was not sure if it was because there was another event going on at the church, because I heard a lot of people in the main hallway. As I walked on stage, I was welcomed with a warm crowd and was overwhelmed by the turnout of this concert, with much thanks to Marla Winters and April Gibson who organized this section of the tour. All of a sudden, I felt this new source of energy as I sat in front of the piano with an audience of over 100 people. I absorbed this energy and turned it into a fantastic performance. I was overwhelmed by the amount of support I received as I talked to many wonderful music teachers and students at the reception following the concert. It was a really nice feeling to know that people appreciate what you do and really enjoy it. After the reception, my parents and I were warmly invited over to April Gibson and her husband's home for the night. We would like to give a huge thank you to them for being such kind, welcoming, and generous hosts. They made us feel right at home and my parents and I are really appreciative for their generosity and hospitality.

Regina was our next destination. The drive to Saskatechewan was peaceful and tranquil, with the narrow road surrounded by a vast expanse of prairie, hay stacks, cows, horses, and the open blue sky. It was my first time visiting Saskatchewan as a destination. As we arrived in Regina, I was amazed by the simple beauty of the city. It was surrounded with nature and the weather was slightly warmer than what it was in Winnipeg at the time, which felt great. I did not have a concert that day, so my parents and I took some time to explore the city. We took a walk around Wascana Lake, which had a stunning view with the colours of autumn vibrating throughout the park. We also took a visit downtown and was surprised by how clean and well-managed it was. Overall, it was a great day to unwind and get ready for the next segment of the tour. The next day, I was interviewed by French CBC on TV, which was an amazing experience for me. I would like to thank Marilyn King for setting up this great opportunity, which allowed the tour and organization to gain some publicity. The concert in the evening took place at the home of Karen Frandsen, who had a wonderful self-built studio with very nice acoustics. I would like to thank Karen for letting us use her studio and Sandra Kerr for organizing the concert in Regina. The piano had great power in its bass that seems to fill the entire studio with a wonderful wash of sound. It was nice to meet all the music teachers and students who came to this house concert.

After Regina, we made our way to Swift Current. As we arrived, the first snow flakes of the season began to drift down just as we made it to our hotel. The concert took place in a very beautiful church with a gorgeous Yamaha grand. I could feel the quality of this instrument right from the very first note, as it seemed to respond to every subtle adjustment and could produce both the most beautiful pianissimos and the grandest fortes. I was very glad to see many young piano students who were encouraged by their teachers to come to this concert. My performance went smoothly, with the piano producing every colour I wanted. Afterwards, the organizer got all the kids up to the front to give them Smarties, which I thought was a great way to inspire them; a live performance with some chocolate afterwards. Again, I would like to thank Marilyn King for organizing this concert and the interview in Regina. I could really tell that this community cherishes music education for their youth, which is really important in today's society.

The last concert took place in Saskatoon. It was a very beautiful city and our hotel was right beside the river

with a great view. I could feel that the tour has taken its toll as I was extremely tired as we arrived. The concert was at 3 pm in the afternoon and I remembered thinking to myself that playing the Prokofiev was going to be like climbing Mount Everest after running a marathon. Luckily, this church had an amazing Yamaha concert grand,


which really inspired me during my performance. I could feel its soft touch producing an angelic tone quality and its raw power in all registers of the keyboard, allowing me to express the tranquility of Scarlatti, lyricism of Chopin, grandeur of the Waldstein, and untamed character of the Prokofiev. I would like to thank Kathleen Solose for organizing this concert in Saskatoon. It was a fantastic way to end the tour and I felt a sense of relief mixed with a touch of sadness as I realized that the tour was officially over and I would have to go back to biochemistry class at 8:30 am the next morning. I have gotten to enjoy performing so much on this tour that I did not want it to end.

Overall, it has been an incredible experience for me. Opportunities like this are extremely valuable for young musicians like me and I am very thankful to have been able to go on this concert tour.
