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



Hopefully by now your curiosity has been piqued. What is the big deal?


Well, we knew right from the start that we needed to support the additional expenses of a National Vocal Competition. We worked hard to raise these funds through sponsors, donors, and grants.



The recital was well attended, and a reception followed.

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

Musicthon is Coming!



Tiny Tunes classes are held in daycares reaching 250-300 children, taught by Margot Harding, B.FA, B.Mus Opera, RMT. Clearly these programs are well run and children are thriving under this programming. It was touching to see the connection children had with the music and instructors, especially considering many of the challenges these children have faced in their short lives.

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
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About Tiny Tunes

Tiny Tunes - Sharing time

Tiny Tunes is a music program formulated especially for children up to 7 years of age. The children are grouped by age and put in a class where they then experience age appropriate music. They learn to sing and listen, as well as explore various instruments such as, bells, sticks, resonator bars, wood blocks, drum, triangle, singing bowls, maracas and whatever else I can get my hands on. They are taught to always respect the instruments but also to be creative in thinking of how to use them.

Recordings are used to encourage the development of listening skills. The children guess what the sounds are (animals, kitchen sounds, etc.), and have musical stories that they act out, such as Dance of the Leaves, Little Rabbit etc., set to a variety of classical melodies by Mozart, Rossini, Bizet, Tchaikovsky, and others as well as music from other genres.

For over 20 years I have taught music in the daycares and the response from these children is always humbling and amazing at the same time. All these daycares are in low income areas and a number of the children are Child and Family Services rescues with foster parents/single parent. Most are unable to afford extra activities that others take for granted. Music is a ray of sunshine and something they really look forward to. It awakens their creativity, expands their brains and teaches them confidence in themselves. It also gives them the belief that they can do anything no matter where or what they come from and above all -BREAKS THE VICIOUS CYCLE OF POVERTY!

About Little Miracles Music and Play

Situated in Winnipeg's North End, the Little Miracles Music and Play program has touched the lives of many families, both in the immediate neighbourhood and larger Winnipeg North West community. The program, which was developed by Ann Brough and myself, came into being when I mentioned to Ann my long-held dream to offer free pre-school music classes to our community. Unbeknownst to me, Ann's husband and another church elder had been discussing the possibility of creating a free mom and toddler program at St. John's Presbyterian Church. The synchronicity seemed bigger than all of us, so we got busy procuring funds, instruments, books, toys, volunteers, and whatever else it took to begin.

Classes began in September 2012 and have run each school year since. The program is open to children birth to 6 years of age and every child is accompanied by a caregiver. We begin at 9:30am each Monday with a 45-minute music class. Caregivers take an active role in supporting and encouraging their child's musical participation. Music class is followed by snack, then play and crafts. The momentum and support received by the Little Miracles program has been a blessing and a miracle in itself, as well as a lesson to dream big!

The music curriculum draws primarily from the Suzuki Early Childhood Education (SECE) program, which fosters the development of musical







skills through aural, rote and visual supports and recognizes the importance of an engaged and encouraging community. With its multi-sensory approach, Suzuki pedagogy works well with the very young who usually learn through all senses at once. Dr. Shinichi Suzuki (1898-1998) developed a system of teaching music that mimics how we teach language. He was particularly passionate about Early Childhood development. His dream was to inspire the development of a "noble soul" in children's hearts through the appreciation and creation of beautiful music, and for that he was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. With this core intention and nonfranchised nature, Suzuki Music has been a big inspiration and resource in creating the Little Miracles program. Dr. Suzuki's book, Nurtured by Love, (first published in 1969) reflects his wisdom, passion and dedication to the significance of early childhood experience and remains an inspiring and important source to this day.

Music class begins with each child playing "Good Morning to ____ (C C E G high C)" on either an alto metallophone or xylophone. The instruments used are of the highest standards with the goal of this activity being less about playing correct pitches and more about attaining a soft mallet technique that results in lovely, rich tone. The children are drawn by the beautiful sounds

created, and in this age of electronic music, what a wonderful introduction into the world of acoustics! Even the very young seem focussed as we let the rich sounds linger, fostering the development of attention as well as musicianship. Each child in attendance is given a turn, even if it is only through listening. I was once told by a 3-year-old boy who hid behind his mother as she played and we sang to him each week, that his favourite part of the class was when everyone sang his name. Mirror neurons, which allow us to learn through observation only, are in abundance with the very young. I have seen children play a perfect melody with beautiful tone when they have mostly only watched for a period of time. Environment and support are as crucial to learning as actual experience.

Because the SECE curriculum was created for children up to 3 years of age, music class is supplemented with Orff activities suitable for the very young. We have many age appropriate instruments such as shakers, drums and resonator bells that we play as we sing or listen to recorded music. A really good source for Early Childhood songs and games is Move Sing Listen Play – Preparing the Young Child for Music by Donna Wood (©1982, Gordon V. Thompson Limited, Toronto, Canada).

Panel Q & A With Piano Examiners:

n a beautiful Sunday afternoon, October 27th, a group of students and MRMTA teachers came together to listen and ask questions to 3 well known examiners in Winnipeg. For 2 hours, our examiners answered all kinds of questions from technical details to human approach in certain situations. They were able to bring many examples and anecdotal stories with every answer. The fact is that together, these 3 examiners had more than 100 years of experience!

The most important thing we learned that day is how "human" the examiners can be. We often have the impression that the examiners are insensitive, all dedicated to their job, and not very attentive to the feelings of the candidates going in to the examinations room. It's not true. Actually, Jenny said a phrase that explains it so well: "Every person has a story..." as she spoke about these adult students, and students of all ages who are challenged with difficulties in their life, and who still have the courage to go ahead and do their exams.


Of course, the examiners have expectations, and there is a strict list of rules to follow to ensure that every candidate is treated equally. But, if the student has done the work, well guided by his or her teacher, the result should be successful. When the music played is felt, respecting the expected elements, tempo, nuances, etc. it's not a memory blank, or a slip that will make you fail your exam. The mark on each piece is all-inclusive, like a picture of the performance, based on all the elements together.

We would like to thank our 3 examiners for sharing their expertise with us, for their generosity, and their passion... they all stayed for discussion with the students during the coffee and refreshments time at the end! A big thank you to Eleanor Lwiwski who was hosting the event. We all came back to our studios with a new energy that day!

- Hosting a recital during intermission at a sporting event


By taking our music directly into the community we can continue to branch out in new and innovative ways.
