The vocal masterclass was facilitated by U of M faculty member Monica Huisman. Our heartfelt thanks to her for sharing her advice and insights. Four talented participants performed:

Students were encouraged to create a character and invent a scenario for each song. Their job, they were told, was to take the audience somewhere else, using the text, their eyes and the whole body. "It's better for the audience, more fun for you and easier for the accompanist to follow."

Singers were reminded to be aware of how the accompaniment informs the song and to listen and collaborate with their pianist.

Of course, in which ever language, the vowels must be as long as possible, consonants on the pitch and "over done".

The singers responded enthusiastically to all the ideas and the technical advice they received. Ms. Huisman carefully tailored the advice to the needs of each student. They had much to take away from the class and teachers and students alike enjoyed the enthusiasm and energy that Monica brought to the afternoon.

# Piano

Thank you to each of the students who participated in this year's Piano Masterclass, facilitated by **Dr. David Moroz**.

**Nathaniel Liu** (student of Bennet Charter), played *Variations of a Theme of Paganini* (Berkovich). Nathaniel was encouraged to vary the way each phrase is played and to avoid predictability.

**Roy Zhang** (student of Bennet Charter), played *Waltz in A Flat Major, Op.34, No. 1* (Chopin). Roy was challenged to play the introduction with "more abandon," and to gracefully taper off the ending of phrases to give the effect of notes floating away.

**Josh Gong** (student of Tetyana Novytska), played *Ballade in G Minor, Op. 23* (Chopin). Dr. Moroz suggested using quarter-pedalling to help join repeated notes for a more legato tone.

**Damon Raichura** (student of Madeline Hidebrand), played *Capriccio in C Sharp Minor, Op. 76, No. 5* (Brahms). Damon was asked to consider this as a "wild dance that wants to get started."

**Anna-Lucia Mena Shevchenko** (student of Yaroslava Shevchenko), played *Homage to S.R.* (Schneider). Dr. Moroz pointed to the importance of organizing how to communicate the entirety of the piece, beyond just the introduction.

The Masterclass event concluded with a celebratory short concert featuring one student from each class followed by a lovely reception. Nathaniel Liu enthusiastically represented the Piano Masterclass. Thank you to Laura Liu for organizing this event, and to Dr. David Moroz for so generously and eloquently sharing his expertise and knowledge.

# Flute

Our flute students were once again treated to the spectacular and engaging teaching of Layla Roberts. Our program consisted of the following...

- Holly Penner Sonata in A Minor (Movements 1 and 4) by Handel
- Amy Farrell Carnival of Venice by G. Briccialdi
- Princess Yangco Allegro by Leonardo Vinci

Layla talked about the importance of breath control and ways to achieve a full breath from the bottom up that will "go the distance" throughout each phrase.

We discussed various ways to bring out the theme within a busy line and how to "overact" characters so that the audience can hear them come alive in the *Carnival of Venice*.

We were reminded of ways to aid our interpretation of Baroque music: using terraced dynamics, holding long notes for their full value and determining background and foreground notes within each phrase.

Holly performed Handel's Sonata in A minor (mvt 4) at our mini recital.

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# What I Learned From a Huge Pile of Old Music Part 1

It all started when I was given a suitcase full of old music near the beginning of March. The music had been purchased at an estate auction by an acquaintance many years ago. She is not a musician, had no idea what to do with the music, but packed it away to do something with later. And so it eventually came to me.



I had no idea what to expect when I opened the suitcase. Maybe I would find something useful, maybe not. As I lifted the lid,



the musty smell of paper immediately hit me. "Wow!" I thought, "this stuff is really old." On the top were several pieces of sheet music measuring 10.5" x 13.5"; I've since learned that was the size used primarily before 1920. I lifted that stack out to discover what was underneath.

As I began sifting through this treasure trove, a picture of the original owner began to emerge. The name on the majority of the music was "Eileen Weir" followed either by an address on Jubilee Avenue or on McNaughton Avenue. Approximately 80% or so was vocal music and she was clearly a soprano by the range indicated on the covers! Other names popped up occasionally – maybe she had borrowed music and not returned it? Don't wag your finger at her! We're all likely guilty of that! One name stood out – Olga Irwin. According to The Canadian Encyclopedia, she was a 'leading soprano' in Winnipeg, she conducted the Winnipeg Senior Citizen's Choir for a number of years, and it turns out she also worked at Tredwell's with a friend of mine. Could it be that Olga taught Eileen?

There was some piano music as well, so I began sorting the music into piles – piano here, vocal there – approximately a 20/80 split. Within the vocal music I soon noticed trends. Eileen liked opera. There were opera solos in the sheet music although, on closer inspection, only 2 or 3 appeared used. She even had an entire score of Verdi's *Aida*. Had she sung in a Manitoba Opera (MO) production? Must have been in the Chorus, I decided, since those songs had all the pencil marks. I did a little digging on the MO website and discovered they did indeed mount a production of Aida in 1975.

She also liked popular music as there must have been close to 50 pieces of sheet music in that genre. The majority of these had dates from the 1940s. Several covers had photos of movie stars who popularized the song – think Bing Crosby singing White Christmas in "Holiday Inn" and you'll have the idea. Some stars Eileen must have really liked as their names were on several selections! Jeanette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy were two such stars! Many song titles I didn't recognize, but the lyricist or composer was familiar. Names like Oscar Hammerstein II, Lorenzo Hart, and Rudolf Friml popped up often. The Way You Look To-night was Eileen's oldest sheet music. It appears that she bought it on October 19, 1936 and her handwriting was less polished than on her later purchases.



The genre that took me down 'memory lane' was all the classical vocal music, and there were several titles I recalled playing as an accompanist back in the day. Memories of the years I served as principal vocal accompanist at Canadian Nazarene College are among the fondest of my career. There were a couple volumes of Brahms, some Schubert lieder, and then the English art songs I love so much. Who can argue with a text like this by W.H. Davies paired with music by Michael Head?

Sweet Chance, that led my steps abroad,
Beyond the town, where wild flowers grow —
A rainbow and a cuckoo, Lord,
How rich and great the times are now!
Know, all ye sheep
And cows, that keep
On staring that I stand so long
In grass that's wet from heavy rain —
A rainbow and a cuckoo's song
May never come together again,
May never come
This side the tomb.

The song became all the more poignant to me when I learned the text was penned in 1914, the same year that WWI began, and the music written in 1929 during those golden years between the two world wars. This sheet music is autographed by Head and dated April 24, 1947. Could it be that he was adjudicating in Winnipeg?



Another pile of music was folk songs from around the world. With the surname 'Weir' I wasn't at all surprised to find Celtic selections like *My Ain Folk, Annie Laurie,* and *I Know Where I'm Goin.* There was also a song titled *Gathering Daffodils* which was collected and arranged by Arthur Somervell and Sir Harold Boulton who is better known for writing new words for *Skye Boat Song.* According to a handwritten note on the cover, Eileen sang about the daffodils in the 1938 Festival! The following year on March 21st 1939 she sang *Young Love Lies Sleeping* – a poem by Christina Rossetti set to music by Arthur Somervell. Again, a handwritten note on the cover indicates Eileen was awarded a mark of 79 and was 'Tied with [competitor] 6 for 4<sup>th</sup> [place]' which made me wonder, was that a heartbreak for a young singer?

Probably the most fascinating find in this category was in the book "Botsford Collection of Folk Songs" first published in the USA in 1922. It contained songs from all over northern Europe including a Russian carol titled 'The Christ is Coming'. Was this collected in Czarist Russia, I wondered in amazement?!



I kept sorting. What began as an evening's pastime turned into a two week long quest! Who was Eileen? Just how diverse was her taste in music? It was a glimpse into the past – not just Eileen's past but also Winnipeg's past.

### Dear MRMTA Members and Executive,



### A Day of Inspiration and Talent

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
